Bud Beasley honored at "Roast and Toast" for 90th



The occasion was a "Roast and Toast" staged by the Reno Kiwanis Club to honor "the Coach" and as a fund-raiser for the Reno Kiwanis Community Foundation. A PROCLAMATION! HEAR YE! HEAR YE!

From this moment and for all time forward, know all men (and women) that:

Whereas **Bud L. Beasley** has been acknowledged by all as the "idea man" whose inspiration and perseverance led to establishment of the Reno High School Alumni Association; and



Whereas **Bud L. Beasley** has devoted countless hours to attendance at a myriad of Reno High School class reunions and other school-related gatherings, at each one pleading his case for establishment of said Reno High School Alumni Association; *and*

Whereas the forenamed **Bud L. Beasley** cajoled, pleaded with and in general bullied all within his hearing until he found others to do the actual work of creating the Association; and

Whereas said **Bud L. Beasley** became one of the three incorporating Trustees of the Nevada non-profit Reno High School Alumni Association in October 1995 and continues to serve as a member of the Association's Board of Trustees; and

Whereas establishment of said Reno High School Alumni Association led to the financial support of a fellow ex-Husky whose largesse permitted construction of the Association's Link Piazzo Alumni Center on the Booth Street campus of Reno High School; and

Whereas, through his persistence in his belief in the need for the aforesaid Reno High School Alumni Association, **Bud L. Beasley** finally found a repository for the thousands of photographs, newspaper clippings and other bits of memorabilia that throughout the years have come to make his home nearly impassable for his devoted wife, Nellie, and friends; and

Whereas Bud L. Beasley contributed the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) from personal funds to establish the Bud Beasley Challenge to his former students and associates; and

Whereas said Bud Beasley Challenge has resulted in numerous contributions of \$1,000 or more in matching funds to the benefit of the Reno High School Alumni Association; and

Whereas **Bud L. Beasley** persisted in his demand for regular operating hours for the Reno High School Alumni Association's Alumni Center in the high school campus until the Board of Trustees of the Nevada non-profit corporation did, in fact, establish such hours; *and*

Whereas Bud L. Beasley continues to recruit volunteers to staff the center during those operating hours each Friday and Saturday and himself fills some of those hours, often in the company of his devoted wife, Nellie; and

Whereas said Bud L. Beasley entered upon the profession of school teaching immediately following his graduation from the University of Nevada in Reno in 1935 and now is in his 65th continuous year of that profession through his participation as an educator at Washoe High School; and

Whereas **Bud L. Beasley's** dedication to the field of education has been recognized by Trustees of the Washoe County School District, who caused his name to be affixed to the **Bud Beasley Elementary School** in Sparks; and

Whereas the memorabilia displayed in the entryway of that school includes tributes to not only his career as an educator, but to his former part-time life as a pitcher in professional baseball's Western League and the highly-regarded Pacific Coast League (in which he performed for a total of eight years during summer recess from his teaching duties at Reno High School); and

Whereas the man known for his left-handed "windmill" windup on the pitchers' mound still is famed as one of the world's foremost presenters of baseball's classic poem, "Casey at the Bat;" and

Whereas the thousands of former students who have come to know and respect the man they know variously as "Bud," "Beas," or "Coach" now wish to honor him on the occasion of his ninetieth (90th) birthday;

Now let it be declared that Friday, the eighth day of December in the year 2000 A.D. shall be known at the Association's Link Piazzo Alumni Center and throughout the remainder of the civilized world now populated by **Bud L. Beasley's** former students and other Alumni of Reno High School as

MANHUNT FOR KILLER STARTED IN RENO

Second Member of Bandit Pair Who Slew Officer Is Still at Large

GUN BATTLE IS FATAL TO POLICEMAN AT HIGH SCHOOL

Although an intensive search was instituted yesterday by Reno police to ferret out the fugitive, no trace was reported at a late hour last night of the wounded burglar who escaped from the Reno High School building late Thursday night, where he engaged in a gun battle in which Ross Peterson, Reno policeman and a second burglar identified as George Welsh, ex-convict, were killed.

Every avenue of escape from the city has been guarded and every possible clue which might lead to the whereabouts of the missing man was being investigated last night. The net is widespread and it is not believed the man can long remain at large.

CITY SHOCKED

The entire city was shocked yesterday at the news of the tragedy at the Reno high school at a late hour Thursday night, which did not become known until the bodies of two men were discovered shortly before six o'clock yesterday morning when J.H. Reed, janitor, arrived to open the school building for the day.

The body of Welsh was lying on the floor of the main hall close to the door of the main hall close to a door leading to the library. That of Peterson was near the door of the outer office of Principal E.O. Vaughn where Peterson mortally wounded, apparently had made an effort to reach a telephone to notify police headquarters.

Fifteen bullet holes and 14 empty cartridge shells, found in and about the hallway and library room, showed the terrific battle which had taken place between Peterson and the burglars and the courageous fight the officer had made for his life.

SURPRISED BURGLARS

Peterson, who was assigned to duty at the high school building Tuesday as night watchman during the opening days of school, surprised the burglars as they entered the school, with the intent to opening the safe in quest of money believed to have been left there from students' books and other deposits.

...Peterson according to a reconstruction of the tragedy, probably was on the first floor where he converged with Bell when the latter departed. He no doubt

heard the crash of the glass and accosted the men as they came up the stairs. That the men met in close quarters is evident from bruises on Peterson's body and powder marks on Welsh's hands.

BLOODSTAIN FOUND

After Peterson and Welsh fell, it is believed the second burglar made his getaway. Blood at the foot of the stairs, at the broken window, and along the walk at the rear of the building indicates that he was badly wounded. From the direction of several of the bullets it is believed Peterson continued the battle after being wounded and lying on the floor.

...Officer Peterson was widely known in Reno and vicinity, his parents being early settlers of the valley. He had resided here all his life. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Olive S. Peterson, and three sisters, Mrs. H.C. Diskinson, and Mrs. C.H. Knox of Reno and Mrs. Harry Knox of Los Angeles.

Born and raised in Reno, she is married to Doyle Sutton, a retired fire battalion chief and has one daughter, Reenie Griffin. 

Board Member Profile

Membership Vice President Lenley E. "Len" Crocker, one of three founding trustees of the RHSAA, was chosen as its charter president and served four years in that position until January of this year.

Born March 20, 1926 in Sacramento, CA, he became a Nevadan at age five when the family moved to Sparks. Four years later, a move to Reno pointed him toward his 1943 graduation from Reno High School, which was followed by World War II service in the U.S. Army, then graduation in 1950 from the University of Nevada with a major in Journalism.

A 19-year career with the morning newspaper Nevada State
Journal was interrupted briefly
by activation from the Army
Reserve for service during the
Korean Conflict and was followed by 23 years in employee
publications for First National
(later First Interstate) Bank of
Nevada, from which he retired at
the end of 1991.

Currently, he serves on the boards of Nevada non-profits Veteran Hospital Foundation and Friends of Washoe County Library (his wife Lois is president of both organizations) and is chairman of Washoe County's West Truckee Meadows Citizen Advisory Board.

Building needs staffing during visiting hours
