I was surprised at the price that she quoted me and it was .0176c per letter or a total of \$106 but that was after a \$111 fee for setting up.


I have to go talk to her and see if that is just a one time set up fee, and would the cost be .175 per letter after that


## Late Fall?

## Reno High School acquires New Principal Rob Roberts

Inclines Village's loss became Reno High School's gain this summer as former Incline Village High School Principal Dr. William E. "Rob" Roberts made the trip down the hill to assume similar duties as heard of the Huskies lair.

Roberts left behind an 11 year record of community activism and recognition in the north east corner of the lake of the sky, beginning in 1990 when he became department chair and a teacher at Incline Villiage High School, with collateral duties as coach of both the debate team and the rifle team.

During that time, he oversaw the area's Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps program. Which involved 45 percent of the high schools entire student body and was ranked number

His first assignment as a school principal came in 1997 when he moved to Incline Middle School, but he lasted only one year before moving back to the high school as its principal.

Roberts also was a veteran of 22 years service as a commissioned officer in the U.S. Army from which he retired as a lieutenant Colonel.

His assignments during that time included a stint as a department head directing instruction and training of the 4000 member corps of cadets at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point.

The new Reno High School Principal is an experienced helicopter pilot, and as such serves the auxiliary deputy in the Washoe County Sherrifs Department. He is an avid water skier and succeded retiring Reno High School Principal Janrt Ross.

Our volunteers are valuable to us, and deeply appreciated.


## LINK PIAZZO

## VISIT OUR WEB SITE AND BE IMPRESSED


