BLAST FROM THE PAST- Bud Beasley

The following article appeared in the September 21, 1945 issue of the RHS Red and Blue entitled "Psychology Pitching Pay off for Reno Teacher." In the summers, Bud Beasley pitched for Sacramento Solons and Seattle teams in the Pacific Coast League.

"Bud L. Beasley, Reno High PE instructor and assistant coach was recently featured in the Sporting News, the country's leading baseball magazine, garnered an outstanding pitching record during the current season.

Beasley's unorthodox style is making history in the baseball world. By studying every player who will face him, Beas is able to take advantage of the other's weaknesses.

Some call it clowning; the batters cry, 'Voo-doo!' Whatever his methods, they certainly bring results.

Bud has been known to pitch to one batter for 10 minutes before striking him out. During this interval, Bud's antics keep the fans amused.

In a typical 10 minutes at the plate, Bud changed balls five times, juggled them, tied his shoelace intermittently, conferred with his catcher, and strolled nonchalantly over to the dugout for a drink of water. Before the pitch he strode to the plate borrowing his opponent's bat to remove dirt from his cleats. Just by way of variety, he requested that the umpire dust off the plate. The fans were wild with glee. However, the batter was in danger of losing his mind.

Bud has made many new friends among his teammates and has become the most popular player on the west coast."

Bud Beasley was a teacher and coach at Reno High from 1937 to 1969. He also was a co-founders and original trustee of the RHS Alumni Association. Bud passed away in July 2004.

SAD PASSING (JOKE)

Please join me in remembering a great icon of the entertainment community. The Pillsbury Doughboy died yesterday of a yeast infection and trauma complications from repeated pokes in the belly. He was 71.

Doughboy was buried in a lightly greased coffin. Dozens of celebrities turned out to pay their respects, including Mrs. Butterworth, Hungry Jack, the California Raisins, Betty Crocker, the Hostess Twinkies, and Captain Crunch. The grave site was piled high with flours.

Aunt Jemima delivered the eulogy and loving described Doughboy as a man who never knew how much he was kneaded. Born and bread in Minnesota, Doughboy rose quickly in show business, but his later life was filled with turnovers. He was not considered a very smart cookie, wasting much of his dough on half-baked schemes. Despite being a little flaky at times, he still was a crusty old man and was considered a positive roll model for millions.

Doughboy is survived by his wife Play Dough three children, John Dough, Jan Dough and Dosey Dough, plus they had one in the oven. He is also survived by his elderly father, Pop Tart. The funeral was held at 3:50 for about 20 minutes.

- RHS Senior Army Instructor, Lt Col Scott Maryott, was selected to be the new WCSD Director of Army Instruction (DIA). He will now supervise 11 high school ROTC programs in the district.

HERB FOSTER'S LETTER

Last quarter's RHS Alumni Newsletter contained a letter from Herb Foster to Dave Ryan, Class of 1947, prior to Herb's death in December 1948. The letter also mentioned the members of the 1948 football team as follows;

"Centers are Fife, Sandorf, Harrigan, and Marshall. Guards are the Watermans, Lazovich and his little brother, Akert, and a couple of sophomores. Tackles are Manson, Dietz, Gerbatz, Gadda, and Cauble. Ends are Mendiola, Cline, Morrison, Evans, and Larralde. Quarters are Hilts, Richards, Art Davies and a couple of others. Left halves are Pickins, Carano and a new comer named Kronemyer. Right halves are Fox, Marks, and Kottinger. Full backs are Vietti, Coleman, Rusk, and Styris."

ALUMNI NEWS

- 1. Former Senate Majority Leader, **Bill Raggio** was honored at the Legislature by declaring March 27, 2013 as, "Bill Raggio Day." Bill, Class of 1944, died in February 2012.
- 2. **Ty Cobb**, Class of 1958, appeared in two recent articles in the RGJ. One he wrote was about the Vietnam War being over for 40 years and the aftermath that followed. He mentioned that he was the last American back from Vietnam and was the first American soldier to meet with the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong after the ceasefire was signed. Ty was also the first to go to Hanoi to begin the release of our POWs and the implementation of the Peace Accords. In the other article, Ty commented on the death of Former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher. As a national security aide to President Ronald Reagan, he had great insight into their relationship.
- 3. An article appeared in the RGJ on April 16th about two Reno High graduates and RHS Alumni Board Members, **Neal Cobb and Jerry Fenwick**. The two are preparing a second volume of their popular 2008 book, "Reno Now and Then."
- 4. Master Sergeant **Bob Ridderbusch** died in April in Salem, Oregon. He was the Reno High JROTC Senior Army Instructor and Rifle Team Coach from 1973 to 1990.
- 5. **Judy Vasconcelos**, Class of 1956, died on April 7th. From 1974 to 2003, she taught English, theater, and led RHS debate teams to many State titles.
- 6. **Ralph Casazza**, Class of 1946, died on April 4th. Over the years, Ralph and his firm specialized in the design of shopping centers, jails, schools, public buildings, banks, industrial facilities, casinos, postal buildings and churches. Closer to home, he designed the RHS Alumni Center building and was a member of the Alumni Association Board.
- 7. The RGJ profiled **Michael Fischer**, Class of 1967, who was a Gardnerville dentist and has a lifelong fascination of Nevada history. He belongs to a number of Nevada history-related groups and has given performances portraying Governor John Sparks. Michael has also given presentations on the early years of Center Street in Reno and the 1934 disappearance of banker Roy Frisch one of the city's most enduring unsolved mysteries.
- 8. Judge Edward C. Reed Jr., Class of 1942, died on June 1st at the age of 88. Reed served as a legendary District Judge for almost four decades, was president and member of the Washoe County School District School Board for many years, and Reed High School in Sparks was named for him. He was an all-state basketball player for Reno High and UNR. Reed served in the Army during World War II, was captured and imprisoned by the Nazis but later escaped. He graduated from Harvard Law School in 1954. Governor Brian Sandoval said of Reed, "Judge Reed served as mentor to me and was one of the finest judges I have ever known."
- 9. **Glenn Little**, Class of 1958, known as "Reno's Music Man," was honored by having his name added to the Wingfield Park Amphitheater. Little was a member of the Reno Municipal Band since he was 14 and died in November 2012.
- 10.**Cathy Trachok**, Class of 1976 and daughter of Coach Dick and Fran Trachok, was featured in the RGJ concerning her paintings being featured in the June issue of American Art Collector magazine.
- 11. **Rusty Crook,** Class of 1951, announced that after 50 years, he and his wife, Susie, will be closing their south Reno day camp for children called, This Is It Ranch .
