I hope this newsletter finds you in good health and enjoying our spring weather. I want to begin by thanking you for your continued support of the Reno High Alumni Association. As President of the Association I appreciate that you have taken the important step of keeping your membership current. Our Association maintains the Alumni Center on the Reno High campus, coordinates our Triennial All Alumni Reunion and annually awards four \$1,000 scholarships to current Reno High students. The money to complete these three important tasks is generated from two sources, donations and your \$20 yearly membership. I know that your yearly membership is current because you received this newsletter. How many of your friends and classmates that attended Reno High did not receive a newsletter? Sadly, the answer is many of them. I could use your help to increase our current membership. We currently only have 513 paid members. You don't have to be a mathematician to recognize that that is an extremely low number considering the number of Reno High graduates over our 135-year history. Many of your friends have let their membership lapse, or have never been paid members. Donations to our Association are appreciated, but our most consistent method of raising funds is our yearly membership fee. In order to better fulfill the purpose of the Alumni Association, please encourage your friends and family members who are Reno High graduates to pay the \$20 yearly fee and join the Association. An increase in membership will generate funds to improve the Museum, continue to provide our Triennial All Alumni Reunion and to continue to award scholarships to Reno High students. Adopted March 14 1996, "The purpose of this non-profit association shall be to identify and properly recognize the accomplishments of the alumni, students, faculty and staff of Reno High School. Equal attention shall be paid to the academic and non-academic phases of high school activities, in order that a well-balanced picture may be presented to the public. A permanent record of such accomplishments shall be made in a Reno High School Alumni Museum/ Information Center, created and operated by the Association".

ALUMNI NEWS

- 1. **Jamie Melton**, Class of 2004, won the overall title for freestyle skiing at the United States College Ski Association held in early March at Mount Bachelor in Oregon.
- 2. **Judge William Forman**, Class of 1948, died on February 18, 2015. He was appointed Washoe County district judge by Governor O'Callaghan in 1973. Over the years, he was active in many youth organizations including Boy Scouts, YMCA, PTA, and Reno High boosters. He served as exalted ruler of Reno Elks Lodge.
- 3. **Marvel Ranson**, Class of 1929, was featured in the RGJ Women's History Month series. She worked for 33 years in the Washoe County School District teaching at Northside Junior High and Billinghurst Junior High, and later became a counselor at Central Junior High and Wooster High. She died on January 25, 1979, at the age of 66.
- 4. **Martha Patricia "Patty" Cooke**, Class of 1941, was also featured in the RGJ Women's History Month series. She was known for her work on behalf of the mentally ill with the Nevada State Hospital Auxiliary and her crusade to keep Riverside Drive open to the public as a founding member of Truckee Meadows Tomorrow.
- 5. An exhibit honoring the life of **Senator Bill Raggio**, Class of 1944, is on display at the Nevada State Museum in Carson City. Bill died in 2012 and served in the Nevada State Senate for 38 years. The exhibit highlights his early years, including his time at Reno High School.
- 6. **Len Crocker**, Class of 1943, died on February 21. After his military service in WWII, Len worked 19 years for the Nevada State Journal as Sports Editor. He joined the First Interstate Bank in 1969 and worked in the publications and communications area for 23 years. Len was the founding President of the Reno High School Alumni Association.

TEACHER SHAPES MINDS FOR 8 DECADES

This is the second part to the article, "Years of Memorable People & Stories," written by Guy Clifton in the February 19th 2014 addition of the RGJ. This features Reno High teacher and coach Bud Beasley.

In May 2000, I caught up with iconic Reno teacher and coach, Bud Beasley, who was in his 66th year as a teacher – a tenure that touched parts of eight decades in Northern Nevada.

The Guinness Book of World Records was researching whether Beasley's 66-plus years in the classroom is the longest tenure in history.

"I'm not trying to set any records," Beasley had told me. "I'm doing it strictly because I like it.... I like what I'm doing and as long as I like it, I'm going to keep doing it."

His teaching career started as a student teacher at Mary S. Doten Elementary School in 1933. He then moved to Northside Junior High before going on to Battle Mountain High School in 1935 and Reno High School in 1936. At one time or another he coached virtually every sport on the Reno High campus, including football, baseball, fencing, and gymnastics.

He was one of two coaches in state history that won state championships in football, basketball and baseball. (The other was the late Bill Ireland.)

Beasley was also a great baseball player, pitching in the Pacific Coast League in the summers for the Sacramento Solons and Seattle Pilots.

He and his wife, Nellie, had no children of their own, but they raised 17 foster children, all who went on to become successful adults.

Add several thousand former students, and the Beasley family stretches coast to coast.

(Afterward: Bud Beasley died in 2004 at age 93. The athletic complex at Reno High School is named in his honor)


OVER 100 YEARS AGO – WHAT WAS LIFE LIKE BACK IN 1914?

- The average life expectancy for men was 47 years.
- Fuel for cars was sold in drug stores only.
- Only 14% of the homes had a bathtub.
- Only 8% of the homes had a telephone.
- There were only 8,000 cars and only 144 miles of paved roads.
- The maximum speed limit in most cities was 10 mph.
- The tallest structure in the world was the Eiffel Tower.
- The average US wage in 1910 was 22 cents per hour.
- More than 95 percent of all births took place at home.
- Sugar cost 4 cents a pound.
- Eggs were 14 cents a dozen.
- Most women only washed their hair once a month, and used Borax or egg yolks for shampoo.
- The five leading causes of death were: pneumonia and influenza, tuberculosis, diarrhea, heart disease, and stroke.
- The American flag had 45 stars.
- The population of Las Vegas, Nevada, was only 30.
- Two out of every 10 adults couldn't read or write and only 6% of all Americans had graduated from high school.
- There were about 230 reported murders in the entire U.S.A.

The Devise

In Clark Webster's diary dated Thursday, June 9, 1910, he wrote of an interesting situation that occurred at Reno High just before graduation.

"The Sophs got real smart again Wednesday night and put up a big blue banner about 15 feet long with a white 1912 on it on the flag pole. They tied the flag on a stick and fixed slip knots from the stick around the pole. Then they shoved it up the pole as far as they could which was about half way and the slip knot tightened and held it there. Then they took a dummy and slid it out along a wire which ran from a pole to the high school building tower till it hung way out over the yard. Then when the Senior kids came to school the Sophs told them that they'd never get those things down. Four of the Seniors hiked up unto the building and Harvey McPhail climbed the flag pole and took down the flag. That disappointed the Sophs a little but they still thought the dummy was there to stay. I didn't go up to school till nearly ten o'clock so didn't know anything about it. When I got there I found three Seniors out in the yard with a .22 rifle trying to shoot the wire on the dummy's head in two, but they couldn't do it. They came down to my house and I got my tools, and McPhail and myself manufactured a kind of alligator jaw with a trigger in the back that would close the jaws when pulled. Then we took it up to the school house and slid it out the wire to the dummy. The kid on top of the building pulled the string attached to the trigger, the jaws closed on the dummy and they pulled him in and dropped him off the top of the building." (They were so proud of their invention, shown below, that Clark wanted to start his own school club).



"We have decided to organize a "Thomas A. Edison Jr. Club" with *Harvey* McPhail, *Harold* Keatings, *James* Sullivan, and myself as charter members. (The four who were present while the devise was being constructed) and with *John* Lusk and *Little* Barton as honorary members. They came to the house just as we were finishing the job so we admitted them to the club."

The complete copy of Clark Webster's diary is found in the RHS Alumni Museum. His father was the Reno Fire Chief and his grandfather was a District Judge and President of the School Board.
