OVERVIEW OF THE YEAR 2019

Overall the Reno High School Alumni Association had a successful year. The following board members departed: Pat Thomas, Cal Pettengill, John Watson, Brien Karlin, and Nettie Wong. New board members were J.D. Schnabel and Amanda Myers. RHS teacher, Valerie Porter joined the board on January 1, 2020. We are in need of additional alumni to serve as Board members.

Sixteen classes celebrated their reunion this year, including the 50th anniversary of the class of 1969 and 60th for the class of 1959. Both of these classes had part of their reunions at the RHS Alumni Museum.

Four seniors were awarded Alumni Association Scholarships and Betty Jo Baker presented the Westover Family Scholarship in May. The RHS Alumni Leadership Medal and certificate were presented to an outstanding JROTC cadet.

The Alumni Center was used by the Principal for 8th grade orientation in May and used for 3 days by RHS teachers for Freshman Seminar. Washoe County School District counselors used the facility once a month for their meetings. The museum continued to be open to the public on Fridays and Saturdays.

Four quarterly Huskie Trails alumni newsletters were published. We discovered a few RHS Alumni who died in WWI and Afghanistan and their names were placed on the memorial plaque.

Twenty-six life members were added this year for a total of 210 life members. There are 515 active members who support the association and museum. This is very low compared to the many thousand graduates who aren't members. We are always in need of more members and the only way the association and museum is supported is through membership dues and donations.

There are 22 RHS teachers and staff members who are Reno High Alumni. There is a need for class representatives for the following classes: '48, '60, '91, '04 and '08. If interested, contact Betty Jo Baker at (775) 851-3203.

Several improvements to the building include cleaning of the carpet, replacing the windows in the office, and putting in a new vinyl floor in the kitchen. A computer, printer, and copy machine were also purchased. The Association is on Facebook.

Special thanks to Cal Pettengill who became the first museum curator and maintained the website and computer files, updated museum displays, coordinated museum improvements, and managed donated memorabilia. We will miss his dedication and expertise.

ALUMNI NEWS

- Skip Houk Class of 1959, was selected to the Nevada Interscholastic Athletic
 Association (NIAA) Hall of Fame for his outstanding work as a Nevada Football and
 Basketball official (1964-2019). He was also inducted to the Nevada Athletic Hall of Fame
 in 1993 for his excellence as a conference champion cross country and track runner, and
 a national champion boxer.
- 2. **Art Collins** RHS counselor from 1977-2003 was also inducted into the NIAA Hall of Fame as a coach of the RHS boys and girls ski teams. He led the girl's teams to 15 straight team championships and boys teams to 13 consecutive wins between 1980 and 1994. No other sports program at RHS has captured more first place trophies.
- 3. **Dan Anderson**, also an NIAA Hall of Fame inductee was a coach and official. He was head coach for 37 years including at Reno High from 1986 to 2006. Dan worked with boy/girls track and field, football, boys/girls skiing and girls cross country teams at a variety of grade levels. He officiated football for 48 years
- 4. **Lillian LeBlanc** Class of 1924, died in October 2019 at the age of 99. She was an RHS Business/English/typing teacher from 1962 to 1969.
- 5. **Mallory McGwire,** Class of 2016, RHS basketball star plays for Boise State. In the game with UNR, she helped her team win 83-78. Mallory scored 12 points and 9 rebounds. She previously played for Oregon.
- 6. The RGJ listed the top RHS boys basketball players in the last 10 years as follows: Drew Rippingham (2017), Tommy Challis (2018), Scott Challis (2010), Mike Heydon (2016), Karn Goraya (2016), Jacob Rolling (2014), and Kyle Mahaffey (2014). Reno High was the last Northern team to win the state large-school championship in 2008.

20th ANNIVERSARY OF THE RHS ALUMNI CENTER

The idea of an Alumni Center came from the early members of the Alumni Association which was established in 1995. RHS teacher and coach, Bud Beasley, stressed the need for a center as a storehouse for records and artifacts from the earlier Reno High School building dating back to the 1920s. Besides Bud Beasley, the early board members who were instrumental in developing the concept of the building were Len Crocker, Joseph Granata, Frank Petersen, Rose Meredith, Joe Elcano, Jim Binns, and Albert Solari. The class of 1955 raised funds to be applied to the new building. Businessman Link Piazzo donated over \$400,000 dollars for the construction of the Alumni Center building on campus. The alumni board voted to name the center after Piazzo. Architect Tom Casazza, who with his father Ralph Casazza developed the plans for the alumni building. The Washoe County School Board approved plans to construct a stand-alone on-campus Alumni Center on school district property with a 25-year property lease. The lease could be renewed for an additional 25 years. Q&D Construction Company, headed by RHS grad Norman Dianda, was awarded the contract to build the center. A symbolic ground-breaking ceremony was held on Labor Day 1999. Work began the following week and in less than 120 days, the structure was complete including a façade that mirrored an earlier RHS building at Fifth and West streets (1912-1968). RHS Principal Janet Ross reported to the School Board that the new building would be used for special meetings, student testing, Honor Society inductions, etc. At her suggestion, the Board waived the annual lease fee from the Alumni Association.

The official opening was January 1, 2000, a date easy to remember.

The office was furnished by Machabee Office and Supply thanks to RHS grad Gary Machabee. More than 40 upholstered meeting chairs were obtained through the University of Nevada's Continuing Education Department. Through Trustee Ralph Casazza, 10 display cases were purchased from a retailer who was upgrading their display floor. Donations of memorabilia and equipment came from various alumni. A large group of photos of graduating classes and numerous trophies were provided by RHS custodian Kookie Rekucki.

We are indebted to those early Association Board Members and alumni whose vision, dedication, hard work and finances made it possible for us to enjoy the wonderful Link Piazzo Alumni Center. Happy $20^{\rm th}$ Anniversary!

- 7. Midfield girls soccer player of the year was Natalie Colfer.
- 8. Girls golf Northern 4A All-Region first team from Reno include Aislinn Behan, Hannah Penberthy, Sydney Lamb, and Cassidy Krompetz. Girls golf coach of the year is Pam Whalen.
- 9. Senior Skylar Hales is the captain of the basketball team. He is also an outstanding baseball player and will sign with Santa Clara for baseball.
- 10. Also, RHS gymnast Joanna Conrad obtained a perfect score on the math portion of the SAT. The 800 score puts her higher than 99% of those who took the test in the nation. She hopes to attend the Air Force Academy or the Coast Guard Academy next year.
- 11. The RGJ reported that Reno High senior, Kieran Ross, an accomplished gymnast will be attending the University of Alaska next fall. She is following in the footsteps of her sister, Morgan Ross, who is competing at Alaska in gymnastics.

There will be no 4A teams in northern Nevada but there are some in Southern Nevada. Reno Boys Soccer will be in the 3A class. Hopefully, the state football championship game will be played in the new Raiders Stadium in Las Vegas this fall.
