#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

REMINISCING - My curiosity over the past two years as a volunteer has led to quite an adventure. Foremost has been realizing the importance our city planners placed upon education. I've had fun looking through OLD yearbooks to find my RHS legacy that spans from 1930's to 2022. And what a treat it was to get reacquainted with classmates from the '60's. Reno is still "The Biggest Little City in the World". There's something special about the reminiscing that takes place while helping visitors search for information about their relatives and friends. I met proud alumni like Dee Garrett from the class of 1953. The class of 1953 had their 71st reunion in September. That class had such a great time at their 70th reunion, they did it again! This class sets a record for the most reunions held.

Monies left over from their latest reunion were donated to RHSAA. Talk about HUSKIE PRIDE!

TRADITION: The Alumni Center now serves as a bridge for students currently enrolled at RHS to learn about the rich history of RHS. It's become a Fall Tradition! All incoming Freshman tour the Center. And during homecoming week Juniors enrolled in history classes visit the Center to complete a research assignment prepared by teachers. For six periods Juniors spend time carefully examining our collection of memorabilia from 1872 to 2000. The questions concentrate on "What Was It Like To Be A Student in [year?]. The RHS wrestling team even participated in helping us set up for the event! Then the fun began. Phyllis Teipner Pike (Class of '63 and RHSAA VP) and I looked through the vault for newspapers, yearbooks and other memorabilia to be used as research tools. And while we took items out of the vault, Phyllis and I learned right along with the students. Students were curious and asked interesting questions that kept us on our toes. It's always a special time when students want to find their RHS relatives-legacies of four and five generations. That RHS pride filled the Legacy, Heritage and Spirit Halls with laughter, amazement and energy for homecoming. This is a BIG DEAL, and we need more volunteers for it to take place next year. Please Volunteer and learn right along with students. A few students asked if there was anyone alive from the '50's and 60's to interview! Yes, a day of laughter and learning.

This is my last year as a Trustee and President. I appreciate the faith the Board of Directors placed in me. By the time you read this we will have new officers and hopefully a few new volunteers. Come and join as volunteers or become a Trustee. We wouldn't be RHSAA without volunteers, paid memberships, sponsors and donations. Thank you.

#### **JOE MELCHER – CLASS OF 1947**

Thanks to my classmate, Art Ziegler, I had the opportunity to meet and interview JOE MELCHER.

The following includes some of Joe's memories while he attended the RHS located between 4th & 5th Streets:

Joe attended Mount Rose, Billinghurst and RHS. He attended RHS from 1944-1947. He lived on Arroyo Street and rode a bike to school every day. His friend, Irving Crawford, rode on the handlebars of his bike. Joe also rode his bike home during lunch hour as there wasn't a school cafeteria. He vividly described initiation both during Freshman and Sophomore years. Seniors would corral Freshman and smear their clothes with lipstick. This was a real problem for Joe as he only owned 2 shirts and 2 pairs of pants. Sophomore hazing also took place using water hand pumps. Finally, as he put it, he traded his bike for a Model A - 35 Ford coup! He has fond memories of neighbors and friends - Forman, Hug, Winkel, Savage. He said the teacher that contributed the most to his character was David Finch. He described Mr. Finch as a gentleman, a Marine and his English teacher. He also has fond memories of Mr. Ernst and Mr. Pedroli. He admitted to reading Hunting and Fishing and Gun magazines in the library and in study hall. Without locker rooms, there were no showers which meant some classes "smelled bad"! And if a guy didn't have money for tennis shoes, socks were worn. He worked after school as a delivery boy for Joseph Magnin. He was a member of Demolay, remembers great beer busts and smoking pipes at noon in cars where the smoke was so thick, visibility was zero! He also recalled other fun times of "Mugger Busting" and Spotlights" at Virginia Lake. McClatchy in Sacramento was a sister school in 1947.

Joe served in the Air Force from 1948-49 and then the Reserves for 6 years. He worked for Standard Oil Company delivering to stations in Lovelock and Tahoe and later went into sales. Park Wedding Chapel became a family business from 1956 until 2006. He was the Washoe County Recorder for 20 years. He leaves a legacy of RHS graduates. One of Joe's son's, Kevin Melcher, graduated from RHS in 1974 - 1947, then 1974!

Joe – If I have misrepresented any of your memories, please call me. Thank you for sharing your memories and contributing to Huskie Trails. It was a privilege to spend time with you. And, thank you, Art. Toni Poloni

DO YOU KNOW about RHS CORNERSTONES? A word from the vault:

Reno High School Cornerstones and information taken off papers found in the cornerstone that was laid on November 25, 1911 for new high school are in the museum.

Grand Master, Frank Norcross, gave a dissertation on education in the area at the 1911 cornerstone ceremony.

The following items were placed in the cornerstone on 1911:

Proceedings & Code of the Grand Lodge of Nevada, information on bond issue, list of pupils and teachers, a 32-page pamphlet about the schools, a 4 page pamphlet concerning Orvis Ring and McKiney Park schools, information on \$100,000 bond and \$250,000 bond issue, copy of various report cards, copy of the ballot and result of the election, names & salaries of teachers and monthly payroll from 1911

Items transferred from the October 4, 1879 cornerstone were:

A list of the pupils, paper money of 25 cents, 1979 silver dollar, 1811 50¢ piece, 1866 5¢ piece, 1871 silver half dime, 1870 copper¢, a silver florin, a bill of J.J. Quinn for the

From the Reno City School – BD Billinghurst, Superintendent and WA Ferguson, High School Principal 11/25/1911


To the citizens of Reno in the distant future -

"It is an interesting fact that the bond issue of \$250,000 which provided for the new high school building, Mount Rose School and Mary S. Doten was voted on October 1, 1910, the day that legalized gambling terminated by statute n the State of Nevada.

Are you interested in reading the rest of this document? We have it stored in the RHSAA vault along with the ORIGINAL cornerstone document. Just one of the treasures in our museum!. Call for an appointment if you wish to read the 1911 documents. We'll provide the gloves for special handling.

Legacy family letter found in RHSAA vault: A letter from Nancy Pagni – not dated; accessioned 272-02
